I remember walking into my first meeting of the Canadian Hard of Hearing Association. It was in 1996 in Hamilton, Ontario and I was blown away by what I saw, heard and learned that night.

People – happy people! – were using all sorts of technical devices (headphones were BIG back then) – and there was the amazing miracle of real-time captioning. After 40-odd years of not knowing a single person with hearing loss, it's difficult to describe the epiphany I experienced in meeting people like me, who understood my issues almost more than I did. I was hooked and immediately became a member.

My involvement in the organization grew, from attending some local meetings, to becoming a board member and later president of the Ontario Chapter of CHHA, and then serving 10 years on the national Board of Directors.

Along the way, I started to write, present and perform on hearing loss issues. I've presented at many CHHA branches and chapters across the country, as well as in the United States and beyond. Hearing loss became my passion and also a career, including writing a book *"The Way I Hear It: A Life with Hearing Loss"*.

A couple of years ago, I moved from Ontario with my husband Doug, aka the Hearing Husband, to Sidney, BC where Doug had grown up. However, my hearing loss life is not over.

I'm pleased to have joined the BC Chapter of CHHA, and become involved in several initiatives, one of which is becoming a regular contributor to this publication, the e-Loop. I'm still learning about the policies and practices that affect BC's hard of hearing and deaf people, but I'm excited about CHHA's mission of making British Columbia a more accessible and affordable place for people with hearing loss.
