Beyond Silence: A Dialogue on Hard of Hearing Experience

The panel discussion titled, "Beyond Silence: A Dialogue on Hard of Hearing Experience", occurred on February 24 at noon at the Wavefront Centre for Communication Accessibility in Vancouver. The event was open to anyone interested in learning about hard-of-hearing experiences. The discussion featured four hard-of-hearing panellists sharing their journey as individuals with hearing loss followed by a Q and A session. What made the event even more special was that the moderator and the three other volunteers also were hard of hearing, providing an inclusive platform. The event was designed to be an exploration of various experiences and achievements of professionals with hearing loss. Participants engaged in a meaningful dialogue with the panellists who emerged as stronger advocates for accessibility

and inclusion. A series of such discussions will be conducted at Universities, Career schools and other non-profits working towards disabilities in the next year's plan.















The New Horizons for Seniors Program (NHSP): Ageing in Place Through Technology NHSP was completed on March 31, 2024. The project involved senior volunteers and provided assistive devices to enhance safety and communication for seniors in their homes. Volunteers from various areas of British Columbia participated in the program, receiving devices and setup instructions via mail. The project conducted midpoint and endpoint evaluations to track progress and gather feedback, resulting in the publication of a position paper on access to hearing aids. The project aimed to improve seniors' lives by addressing safety and communication concerns through devices like the HomeAware Fire, CO Signaler etc. Volunteers played a crucial role in assisting in setting up and maintaining these devices, fostering community participation and volunteerism.

IMPAIRMENTS OPEN HOUSE event participation: CHHA BC Advocacy: Promoting Awareness

The CHHA BC Chapter was proud to participate in the IMPAIRMENTS OPEN HOUSE event, organized by the Maple Ridge Lions Club on Saturday, April 13, 2023. These resources provided valuable information about hearing health, communication strategies, and available support services. Events like these foster a sense of community engagement and support. CHHA BC is committed to being a resource hub for the community, providing support, education, and advocacy for individuals with hearing impairments.
